Dialogue on gender equality:

Consumption and women's rights

Recently many people all over the Western world rejoiced about the <u>new spot</u> of a transnational shoe company, celebrating its sensitizing towards gender equality and the diversity of women's experiences. Others drew the attention to the fact that while using feminism as marketing strategy the company <u>exploits hundreds thousands of women employees</u> in Vietnam with poor working conditions and <u>has only one woman</u> among its executives. This case points to several questions we want to address at our event.

How is feminism increasingly used as marketing tool? How do brands sell empowerment to women? How do global inequalities come into play when we speak about consumption? What is the role of economic actors in shaping our ideas about what it means to be a "real woman" (or "real man") or even a "good mother/parent" (and what we need to buy for achieving it)? How is demand raised, in beauty industry, in sport industry, in parenting industry and beyond? How do environmental issues intersect with women's rights? How does consumption become a prerequisite of citizenship and how are masses excluded from it? What to do when we can afford only products produced under inhuman working conditions at the other end of the world? How does the region of East-Central Europe connect to the global economy hierarchy and how does it affect consumption patterns and aspirations? What is the role of individuals, companies, national states and supranational actors to make a change?

We kindly invite you to discuss these and other related questions together with experts from the Czech Republic, Slovakia and Hungary.

In October 2014 we launched a dialogue series with representatives of left-wing, conservative and human rights based women's associations and academia, with the aim to search for common ground and cutting through usual cleavages. In the last two and half years we spoke about the topic of motherhood, on changing forms of masculinities, on discourses about child-bearing, on (romantic) love and politics, on dignity, on islam and on birth. With our present forum we would like to continue and deepen the dialogue between different actors concerned by gender relations in the democratic society.
